The holiest week of the year is upon us as we journey with Christ through His day of glory and praise into Jerusalem, celebrate with Him at the commemoration of the First Eucharist, suffer with Him at Golgotha, wait with Him in the tomb and rise with Him in Hope for a better life on Easter Sunday.



Called to embrace the leper, we too can be the voice for immigrants and refugees in a world focused on turning them away.

In this Year of Jubilee, may the message of hope, given to us by the Resurrection inflame within us the burning desire to be Pilgrims of Hope to the world.

In this Year of the Canticle, may the experience of new life in the Resurrection call us to Repair the World and bring new life to all its People.
